### AT A GLANCE

- ▶ We had an average of at least 1 new client starting counselling services every other day
- ▶ We have supported **112** clients in the past year
- ▶ 33% of our graduating clients opted to enroll in our Aftercare: Journey program
- On average, clients only missed 1 session each

# REGISTERED CHARITABLE STA

In December 2023, The Colchester Sexual Assault Centre successfully obtain Registered Charitable Status with Canada Revenue Agency. This process began in September 2020 when the Board of Directors embarked on an exercise to ensure we could position ourselves to take on this added responsibility. After an exhaustive investment into our governance and operations over the course of three years, we were absolutely thrilled and proud that our hard work culminated in our organization becoming a registered charity.

- to invest in our organization's ability to sustain our vital programs and services for many years to come



# COLLABORATIONS ADDRESSING SEXUAL VIOLENCE

## **Truro Pride Society**

Since 2022, the Truro Pride Society has been an incredibly valuable community partner. This relationship has provided us with the ability to better support the 2SLGBTQIA+ community by building a relationship of trust with those who identify as members of this typically under served population. Since this relationship formed, we have seen a steady increase of gay, queer and trans people accessing our services. Our continued involvement in Pride Week celebrations has also helped to raise awareness of sexual violence within the community and has heightened our presence as a trusted source of information and support for everyone in the Town the Truro, Colchester County – and beyond!

## Nova Institution for Women

This past year, we were invited by the Nova Institution for Women to provide education for the staff and residents of the facility. We were incredibly honoured to provide this service to these women and female-identifying residents, as well as the staff who are tasked with ensuring their safety. We provided a series of sessions on sexual orientation and gender identity, healthy relationships and boundaries, sexual violence prevention, and other themes. The goal of this partnership was to not only support them during their incarceration but to also provide them with the tools and access to services upon their release and their reintegration back into the community. Our organization continues to partner with organizations and agencies who are committed to sexual violence prevention initiatives.

## Black Girl Magic Colchester

Our relationship with Black Girl Magic Colchester began in December 2021 when our team members were the recipient of their Ally is a Verb training. Since then, our organization has remained committed to developing relationships within the African Nova Scotian communities within the Town of Truro. Most recently, through funding received from the Truro and Area, Northern Health Zone, Community Health Board, our organizations co-hosted a networking event providing the community with an opportunity to directly engage with the non-profit service providers within the region. Through community consultation, our organizations identified the gaps in service and helped to bridge those gaps by bringing community members together and were treated to an educational presentation from Robert Wright of The Peoples' Counselling Clinic.

# PROGRAMS & SERVICES

We have seen the undeniable impact our organization has had over the past 28 years, with thousands directly benefiting from our free counselling services. We provide an alternative for those with limited financial means, our 12-week offering is valued at just \$420 compared to upwards of \$1,400 through a private practice. Our free counselling services also helps to alleviate the burden placed on our healthcare system and government agencies.

### Counselling

Our team of highly trained Registered Counselling Therapists provide a wide range of mental health counselling, emotional support and psychoeducational services.

One-on-one counselling services are one of the most valuable and accessed services offered through our Community Resource Centre. Each client receives up to 12 free individual counselling sessions for those impacted by sexual violence. intake professional who then pairs the client with the best suited Counselling Therapist based on their unique situation and needs. They will then meet with the same counsellor

> weekly or biweekly for an hour-long session of therapeutic conversation. During treatment the main focus is on developing goals, collaborating on a treatment plan, evaluating progress to determine what future services may be beneficial and charting a course for healing.

## **After-Care: Journey**

The After-Care: Journey Program was created to further support our clients with their healing and growth process after completing individual counselling sessions with a Counselling Therapist. It also acts as an alternative to formal counselling and is open to anyone impacted by sexual violence who may be seeking a less formal support option. This educational, empowerment, and self-care focused program is specifically focused on a client's personal goals and needs.

## What services are currently being offered in the After-Care: Journey Program?

## Educational programming: Wounds of Change: Strengthening Self Worth

This is a guided discussion and workbook that is completed one-on-one and focuses on the following:

- Understanding self-esteem / self-worth and connection to wounds & triggers
- Identifying your values & strengths
- Understanding self-forgiveness and shame and building self-compassion
- Learning about boundaries, healthy relationships, and the role of values and wounds and assertive communication

## 2 Creating a self-care plan and health-focused goals

One-on-one discussion using the *Strategies Tool Kit* and other resources to create a realistic plan for self-care.

## **3** Mini Psycho-educational groups

- Understanding Healthy Relationships
- ► Safety
- Body Oriented Strategies

Body-Oriented Strategies for Trauma is facilitated virtually or in-person, depending on enrollment and is only available to CSAC clients.

This 4-session group would provide the opportunity to learn about the following:

- A. Trauma brief overview of common responses and trauma and the brain
- B. Breathing and mindfulness includes learning breathing strategies and mini mindful practices for your everyday
- C. Guided Practices includes Progressive Muscle Relaxation (PMR), body scans, and meditation
- D. Body-Oriented Strategies


- March 2024, presented to the Municipality of Colchester Council for funding to sustain our programs and services
